A Celebration of Catholic and Lasallian life

On two occasions last week our College community was privileged to celebrate the life and teachings of our Founder John Baptist De La Salle.

Over 300 Lasallians gathered at the Hamilton Cathedral in a Mass celebrated by Cardinal John Dew with the Bishops of all the North Island diocese and eight other Priests con-celebrating. De La Salle College had an enormous contribution to this celebration of 300 years since the passing of our Founder. We lead the music, supplied the Choir and the Fijian community presented the Procession of Gifts.

This Celebratory Mass was a wonderful experience for our young men who were able to witness our Catholic and Lasallian traditions and rituals with members of the two other Lasallian schools in New Zealand. These traditions allow our young men to not only rub shoulders with Lasallians from quite different backgrounds, but to see that these traditions unite and are inclusive of all.

On Friday the whole College community celebrated De La Salle Day in what has been our own tradition for 65 years and a day which had added importance as Lasallian communities world -wide celebrated the Tercentenary of our Founders death.

Our Mass celebrated by our College Chaplain Fr Brian Prendeville was a wonderful celebration of our Founder's life. Our young men of the College owned the Mass, they were reverent and respectful of the occasion and certainly left the Mass with their heads and hearts uplifted in the spirit of John Baptist De La Salle.

Fr Brian's Homily left our young men with a challenge as young Christians. He said that at times we tend to be a little too concerned with the outward symbols of our Christianity, however the real goodness of their faith must come from "within" and be given to others. Christian life was not meant for the faint hearted or those who are comfortable. Christian life has its origins and journey about life and all its ups and downs. I thank the young men of the College for their participation and pride in making our De La Salle Day such a wonderful faith occasion. I thank our Staff for their support and leadership of our Catholic and Lasallian charism which is strong and evident in our College.

Teacher's Strike Day

You will have heard about the proposed Teacher's Strike Day scheduled for Wednesday 29th May.

As a College we are planning for this and I would like to keep you updated on how this will effect us and you as parents. As always we are putting plans in place to ensure the safety of our young men.

The College <u>will be open for supervision</u> of our students whose family are unable to look after them on the day. We will have enough non-union teaching staff to provide supervision, but not enough staff to run our normal teaching programmes.

This day will be a great opportunity for our young men who do come to school, to complete community service under the supervision of staff.

I ask that if you intend sending your son to school on the strike day that you send in a written note stating this and ask your son to hand it to his Dean before next Tuesday. The College Bus services <u>will not</u> be running on the Strike Day.

THE RULES OF THE GAME

Recently an old-boy of about 19 came in to school and I had a talk with him. He was working in a warehouse and looking for a way ahead, so that he could be sure that he could provide for his family. I could have given him several pointers and a long speech, but instead I took him to another recent old boy aged 22, who is working two jobs, has been a supervisor and in order to get qualified is studying while working. Old boy number two said to old boy number one, "Well, if you want a better position, and want to be a

supervisor you need to get rid of the number one haircut and the eyebrow slits, because they send the wrong message, and if you get an interview make sure you're prepared. Then you need to make sure you have your licence sorted".

I myself and other teachers have been saying these things to boys for years, but when it comes from another Lasallian of similar vintage it has much more power. Whether its justified or not young people in particular are judged on how they present themselves. That is why we have rules at school about such things. That is why we stand at the front gate and tell boys to tuck in their shirts and do up their ties as they leave. It is why we have a strict clean-shaven policy. These are the rules of the game. We may not always like them, but not following them makes life harder. Following them removes obstacles in the path of boys succeeding in the future. As another old boy once said, 'Learn the game, play the game, win the game, then change the game'.

In the next few weeks, all Year 7 and 8 students will start the 'Jade Speaks Up' programme.

WHAT IS THE 'JADE SPEAKS UP' PROGRAMME?

'Jade Speaks Up' is a programme for safe classroom exploration of being violence-free. It helps children and young teens to learn about:

- Feelings and safe ways to express them
- Trust and the importance of having trusting relationships in our lives
- The Fundamentals of respectful relationships
- How to keep ourselves safe from violence

The detailed exploration in the 'Jade Speaks Up' programme of the skills connected with 'Feelings', 'Trust', 'Respect' and being 'Safe' are core to the essential "4th R" of the school curriculum. We know, that the majority of students will not be exposed to domestic violence yet this programme seeks to be real about family violence while not traumatising those for whom this is not an issue.

Additionally, the only "responsibility" we place on children is to keep themselves safe and to ask for help if they feel it is needed. We do not encourage them to intervene in violent situations themselves.

This programme has a lot to offer and we look forward to when this programme starts.





NCEA Fees

The Minister of Education has announced that families of secondary students will no longer have to pay fees to enter NCEA and New Zealand Scholarship. This change will remove financial barriers and ensure all the credits received towards NCEA will be visible in a student's Record of Achievement. These changes mean De La Salle College will no longer need to collect fees for students who are entering for NCEA and New Zealand Scholarship. Any fees already collected from students for 2019 will either be refunded or redirected to other fees owing. Fees for previous years will not be returned.





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
