Building Young Men with Strong Foundations

The Gospel reading at this morning's College Mass from Matthew : 7 is a great reminder to the staff and students, of what our Vision is for our young men.

"The wise man builds his house on Rock, to withstand the damaging forces it is subjected to".

A metaphor that our community needs to have regular reflection on. What is the "**rock**" that we need to build our young men's education on?

- Quality teaching and learning that challenges our students in the moment but is also aspirational in them seeking to pursue further Tertiary study as lifelong learners.
- Deepening and strengthening of their faith and spirituality through regular prayer and personal reflection on their relationship with God.
- Insistence that every young man completes his Service hours to his local community so that in losing himself in Service to others, he finds himself.
- Desire to be "Excellent" in all aspects of his education, not excellence as a purely lofty ideal, but excellence as seen by a daily habit of doing things to the best of his ability.
- Providing a range of Academic and Vocational pathways, a variety of Sports, Music and cultural opportunities so as to engage our young men in the "community" of the College and provide education of both the "head and the heart".

The above reflect our College Values and it is always of benefit to remind ourselves of these as they are the "<u>foundation</u>" or rock upon which we base the education of our students. Young men today are subjected to the very shifting sands of society and there is much pressure on them to seek shallow satisfaction through Social Media acceptance, the desire for material wealth and instant entitlement of their rights.

A Catholic, Lasallian education founded on looking outwards rather than inwards is what we believe is the antidote to this.

Raising "Great men of Faith, Service,

Community and Excellence", is a tough job but one with many great rewards that we see as a school through the actions of our young men.

We are nearly at the end of Term 2 and I believe that our staff and students are looking forward to the holiday break. Since we first went into Lockdown on the 24th March many of our Staff and students maintained their normal teaching and learning routines without a break and have continued to do so, making this coming break their first for many months. I thank the 300 plus families who attended our College Parent Fono on Monday night, a very positive and encouraging community event, focused on the safety of our young men.

We have taken your ideas and will be using these in our practices aimed at keeping our young men safe. These will be shared with you after we have summarised the many suggestions.

I would like to remind Parents and students that as we come to the end of the term next Friday 3rd July, all students are expected to travel directly home from the College and do not hang around shops or train stations after school. This is a very simple safety practice that we have regularly reminded our young men to follow.

The Special Character of our college is Catholic and Lasallian. Therefore, our school is founded on the Catholic faith with a Lasallian perspective. It is like eating food where the food itself is the Catholic faith and the flavour in which we enjoy the food is Lasallian. The Special Character is upheld through our various college prayer events, religious practices, and retreats. A retreat is an activity which each student with their class goes for a day, reflecting on their relationship with God, their relationship with each other and how they are to improve them. CURRICULUM-Mr Doyle

Ministry of Education Devices

In response to the COVID-19 emergency, the Ministry of Education worked with schools to try and deliver a digital device to students that needed one. The goal was to send them out at the start of Term 2. Unfortunately devices did not appear for many families. Some families received a device towards the end of Alert Level 3. Here at De La Sale we sent out our own school devices to as many students as we could. Thanks to all the families who have returned those so they can be used in classrooms again.



Finally, the school received a number of Ministry of Education devices as we entered Alert Level 2. In total we are aware of nearly 130 devices that were sent to families or the school. To start with the Ministry of Education passwords provided did not work. However, we have resolved that problem and I have been busily sending laptops home with students over the last two weeks. Some of the students have already purchased a laptop so these laptops have been able to be reallocated to other students. The bad news is that we will still not have enough devices YET to support all who need one. We are prioritising Year 11 - 13. The good news is that we have so far been able to send out over 60 devices home.

Each computer takes 10 or 15 minutes to set up. So as the computer loads I have been able to hear about our students experiences in lockdown. For many students it was about sharing a brother or sister's laptop, mum or dad's work computer after they had finished for the day, a smart phone or good old pen and paper. What pleases me is that out of the 80 or so students that I have seen I have only had one who did not try and complete work during the COVID-19 lockdown. Our young men were incredibly creative and resourceful. Some boys waited till late in the evening so they could use a computer. Others wrote long essays on their phones. Others took photos of work and sent to friends to upload on our Office365 and Teams platform. Most boys should be very proud of the way the tried hard to keep up with their school work. So while getting these laptops out to families has been a slow process the long term benefits for our students may be very positive.

We hope the student or students in your home enjoy using the computer and find it helpful when they are learning at home. If your son has a laptop make sure that he registers it with the schools BYOD programme. When students take the laptop home they also take the schools BYOD Agreement with them to be signed. You can also pick up a copy from the school office or get your son to ask his Homeroom Teacher. It keeps him safe when using the device at school. Students must returned a signed BYOD Agreement before they can access the internet here at school.

When I give the boys the BYOD Agreement I make it clear that the student must also have the important conversation with their parents about how, when and for how long they are going to be able to use the device at home. Our students must be talking about appropriate use and safety when online. If at any time you are unhappy about your son's use of the laptop please tell us and we can get him to return it and give it to someone who needs it. We can reassure you that this computer has been pre-loaded with a content filter that protects students from accessing inappropriate websites and content. For more information about online safety, please visit <u>www.netsafe.org.nz</u>. Likewise, if you received a laptop and now do not want or need the computer, please contact the school through your son's Homeroom teacher. We will be able to reallocate to another student so that it can be provided to someone else.

Finally, please note this computer is now owned by De La Salle College and the computer is only for use by the student or students at your address and will need to be returned to De La Salle College when we ask for it later in the year. For students in Year 11 and 12, if the device is cared for they will have access to a device for a number of years. For Year 13 students they will return their devices at the end of the year. These will be given out to younger students in the college.

We thank the Ministry of Education for their support. Their gift to the school has helped level the playing field for some students and will help some of young men reach their true potential.

Y13 RE class debate thorny subject of Euthanasia

The top senior RE class at De La Salle were challenged to debate the subject of Euthanasia, addressing the motion 'This house supports Euthanasia'. Two teams eagerly prepared powerful arguments for and against the motion in the limited time available. The pro-team 'Enthusiasm' was of **Mafi Kiola** and **Shawn Chand**, and the opposing team 'Kipolo' against the motion of **Samisoni Pailate** and **Wilson Nguyen** gave stimulating and compelling arguments. The pro- team who said it was to avoid cruel suffering, that sick and injured animals being commonly put down and the crippling financial issues, and that death was inevitable and is a basic human right. They also pointed out that not everyone is religious so any appeal to theology was unhelpful. The opposing team quoted church teachings, the likely snowball effect if Euthanasia was allowed, and that no one has the right to end another's life, and that with advances in treatment pain and suffering is being reduced. After careful reflection and due process the judge ruled the result was a draw. Well done to all involved.
